Vine	<i>Actinidia</i>	<i>chinensis</i>		Kiwi vine	Male and female needed for fruit production. Male hardy kiwis can pollinize female <i>A. chinensis</i> vines. Attractive foliage. Grows to 20' - 30' ; will cover an arbor. Twines.
Vine	<i>Actinidia</i>	<i>kolomikta</i>		Arctic Beauty Kiwi vine	Male and female needed for fruit production. Attractive foliage; leaves are variegated with white and pink, esp. on male vines. Prefer partial shade. Grow to 10' - 15' . Twines.
Vine	<i>Akebia</i>	<i>quinata</i>		Japanese akebia	Very striking foliage makes a pretty pattern Interesting vanilla-scented flowers may be followed by unusual purple, sausage-shaped, edible fruit. Uncommon. Tendrils.
Vine	<i>Aristolochia</i>	<i>californica</i>		California Dutchman's Pipe	Found in Coast Range and Sierra foothills, growing on shrubs or trees in shade or North exposure.
Vine	<i>Aristolochia</i>	<i>littoralis (elegans)</i>		Giant Dutchman's Pipe	
Vine	<i>Aristolochia</i>	<i>macrophylla (durior)</i>		Dutchman's Pipe	Vigorous eastern native. Tolerates shade or sun. Flowers not as visible as other species.
Vine	<i>Bougainvillea</i>	<i>cultivars</i>	many varieties avail.	Bougainvillea	'Barbara Karst' and 'San Diego Red' are two of the most vigorous, so they recover fastest from winter damage. 'Raspberry Ice' (aka 'Hawaii') is a shrubby type, great for containers, which is relatively cold hardy. <i>B. spectabilis</i> is a purple variety which blooms reliably on the coast.
Vine	<i>Campsis</i>	<i>radicans</i>		Trumpet creeper	Rampant vine with orange flowers, very attractive to hummingbirds. Not as commonly available as <i>C. tagliabuana</i> 'Mme Galen'. Twines.
Vine	<i>Campsis</i>	<i>tagliabuana</i>	'Mme Galen'		A little less rampant than <i>C. radicans</i> , with salmon flowers. Twines.
Vine	<i>Clematis</i>	<i>armandi</i>		Evergreen clematis	Salt-sensitive; leaves burn in Davis and Woodland. Very vigorous grower with fragrant white flowers in February. Grows fine, but leaves look bad.
Vine	<i>Clematis</i>	<i>hybrids</i>	many varieties available		Roots prefer to be shaded; tops in sun or light shade. Add lots of organic material to the soil, and plant them several inches deep. Great to grow up onto other vines, or especially on climbing roses. Pruning varies by variety. Tendrils.
Vine	<i>Clematis</i>	<i>montana</i>	several varieties		The most heat-tolerant species. Great to grow up onto other vines, or especially on climbing roses. Unlike most common Clematis, blooms on old wood, so prune only after bloom is done. Tendrils.
Vine	<i>Clianthus</i>	<i>puniceus</i>		Parrot Beak	Feathery leaves, bright rose flowers. 'White Heron' is white (obviously!). Not common in the trade.
Vine	<i>Clytostoma</i>	<i>callistegioides</i>		Lavender trumpet vine	Beautiful soft-lavender flowers in late spring. Attract hummingbirds. Well-mannered vine. Subject to iron chlorosis in heavy soils and where irrigated too frequently. Tendrils.
Vine	<i>Distictis</i>	<i>buccinatoria</i>		Blood-red trumpet vine	Fast grower with showy red flowers that attract hummingbirds. Damaged by frost, and usually spends a year recovering without blooms. Also sold as <i>Phaedranthus</i> .
Vine	<i>Distictis</i>	<i>laxiflora</i>		Vanilla Trumpet Vine	Vanilla-scented flowers fade to nearly white. Tender here.
Vine	<i>Distictis</i>	X	'Rivers'	Trumpet Vine	Like <i>D. buccinatoria</i> except flowers are purple and plant is tender here.
Vine	<i>Fallopia</i>	<i>baldschuanica</i>		Silverlace vine	Very vigorous vine with profusion of white flowers all summer. Cut back severely every now and then. Covers a fence in one season. Not common in the trade, but occasionally available. Attracts hoverflies (beneficial). Formerly <i>Polygonum aubertii</i> .
Vine	<i>Ficus</i>	<i>pumila (repens)</i>		Creeping Fig	Tiny leaves for 10 - 15 years, then matures and leaves become large. Rampant; roots into supporting structure, tears apart fences, roots are invasive. 'Variegata' makes a cute house plant.
Vine	<i>Gelsemium</i>	<i>sempervirens</i>		Carolina jessamine	Golden yellow flowers in early spring. Attractive shiny green leaves look good all year. All parts are poisonous. Drought-tolerant. Well-mannered and not rampant. Can be kept on a small trellis. Twines.
Vine	<i>Hardenbergia</i>	<i>violacea</i>	'Happy Wanderer'	Lilac vine	Vivid royal purple flowers in winter and early spring. Freeze may damage; usually recovers. Killed in 1990; recovered from roots in 1998. White, pink forms available. <i>H. comptoniana</i> is more tender and not recommended. Twines.
Vine	<i>Hedera</i>	<i>canariensis</i>		Algerian ivy	Large, shiny leaves. Becomes rampant and invasive; roots into structures. Variegated form available.
Vine	<i>Hedera</i>	<i>helix</i>		English ivy	Small to medium, shiny leaves. Becomes rampant and invasive; roots into structures. Smaller-leaved types come in hundreds of varieties; great as filler in containers, or for a ground cover in confined situation. Good houseplants; shower them off periodically to control spider mites when grown indoors.

Vine	<i>Humulus</i>	<i>lupulus</i>		Hop vine	Extremely fast-growing to 30' +. Once grown commercially in the Sacramento area, the female flowers are used to flavor beer. Dies to the ground; resprouts from roots. Availability limited; ask in the bareroot season (winter).
Vine	<i>Ipomoea</i>	<i>acuminata</i>		Perennial Morning-glory	Beautiful sky blue flowers. Perennial vine: dies to the ground each winter, regrowing very rapidly in early April. (invasive in mild-winter areas). Twines.
Vine	<i>Jasminum</i>	<i>mesnyi (primulinum)</i>		Primrose jasmine	Primrose-yellow popcorn-like flowers in late winter. Not fragrant. Vigorous, arching growth habit, like a large shrub. Tie up. <i>J. nudiflorum</i> (Winter jasmine) is very similar.
Vine	<i>Jasminum</i>	<i>nudiflorum</i>		Winter jasmine	Primrose-yellow flowers in late winter. Vigorous, arching growth habit, like a large shrub. Tie up. Availability limited; <i>J. mesnyi</i> is a good substitute.
Vine	<i>Jasminum</i>	<i>polyanthum</i>		Winter or Pink jasmine	Rampant, but worth it for incredibly fragrant white flowers (name comes from pink buds) in March through April.early May in cool springs. Cut back severely after bloom if it has gotten overgrown. Can be forced into bloom in winter in pots by bringing them indoors. Twines.
Vine	<i>Jasminum</i>	<i>sambac</i>		Arabian jasmine	The true jasmine, or Pikake. Tender here, so bring it inside in winter.
Vine	<i>Lonicera</i>	<i>heckrotii</i>	'Gold Flame'	Gold Flame honeysuckle	Moderate grower to 10' with gold and yellow flowers that attract hummingbirds. Easily confined to a trellis by pruning. Twines.
Vine	<i>Lonicera</i>	<i>hildebrandiana</i>		Giant Burmese honeysuckle	Vigorous vine to 15', with very large fragrant white blossoms which age to gold. Rare in the trade because it is difficult to propagate (sometimes grafted onto <i>L. japonica</i> , so watch for suckers!).
Vine	<i>Lonicera</i>	<i>japonica</i>	'Halliana'	Hall's Japanese honeysuckle	Rampant vine with fragrant white flowers (darkening yellow as they age) throughout the summer. Attracts hummingbirds. Can be pruned severely. Twines.
Vine	<i>Lonicera</i>	<i>sempervirens</i>	'Blanche Sandman'	Trumpet honeysuckle	Fast growing vine with scarlet blossoms with ivory throats, blooms from early summer through frost. Hummingbirds love this one!
Vine	<i>Lonicera</i>	<i>sempervirens</i>	'John Clayton'	Trumpet honeysuckle	Orange-yellow to scarlet flowers, scarlet fruit. Attracts hummingbirds and songbirds. Not rampant.
Vine	<i>Lonicera</i>	<i>x brownii</i>	'Dropmore Scarlet'	Scarlet trumpet honeysuckle	Moderate grower to 10' with red and yellow flowers that attract hummingbirds. Twines.
Vine	<i>Macfadyena</i>	<i>unguis-cati</i>		Yellow cat's claw	Grows fast, clings even to stucco or brick by tiny tendrils. Buttery-yellow flowers for a short period in spring. Incredibly heat and drought-tolerant (see the planting across the street from our nursery--never irrigated!). Not common, but occasionally available.
Vine	<i>Mandevilla</i>	<i>laxa</i>		Chilean jasmine	Pretty heart-shaped leaves; white flowers smell like gardenia. Blooms all summer on new growth. Will grow and bloom in shade. Unlike other Mandevillas, it is cold hardy. Availability limited.
Vine	<i>Mandevilla</i>	<i>species and hybrids</i>		Mandevilla	Formerly classed as <i>Dipladenia</i> . Most are not hardy here; <i>M. laxa</i> is an exception. Showy red, pink, or white flowers.
Vine	<i>Muehlenbeckia</i>	<i>axillaris</i>		Miniature Wire Vine	This form is actually a ground cover, creeping across the ground to make a tidy little mat. But otherwise it looks exactly like <i>M. complexa</i> .
Vine	<i>Muehlenbeckia</i>	<i>complexa</i>		Miniature Wire Vine	Vigorous, wiry vine which gets quite dense. Not really attractive, but tough. Not common in the trade.
Vine	<i>Pandorea</i>	<i>jasminoides</i>		Bower vine	Glossy leaves, and fragrant trumpet-shaped flowers in pink or white. Freeze may damage, but recovers. Twines. 'Lady Di', 'Rosea', 'Alba' are selected forms.
Vine	<i>Parthenocissus</i>	<i>quinquefolia</i>		Virginia creeper	Shiny, heavily veined leaves (with five leaflets) turn nice color in fall. Roots into structures. Protect from hot afternoon sun.
Vine	<i>Parthenocissus</i>	<i>tricuspidata</i>		Boston ivy	Shiny, large lobed or divided leaves (three lobes or leaflets) turn nice color in fall. Roots into structures. Protect from hot afternoon sun. 'Veitchii' is a preferred form with smaller leaves on a less rampant vine.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	<i>actinia</i>		Passion flower	Fragrant flowers have white petals, long frilly purple filaments. Plants will resprout from temp's as low as 20F.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	<i>caerulea</i>	'Spyder'	Passion flower	Especially hardy and vigorous form of <i>P. caerulea</i> . Flowers have white and purple crown with white centers.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	<i>citrina</i>		Passion flower	Soft yellow, 1" flowers. Hardy to 20 - 25F.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	<i>edulis</i>	'Frederick'	Passion fruit	Large, fragrant flowers are white with a purplish center and frilled filaments. Outstanding fruit and a vigorous plant, but tender. Fruit must ripen and fall naturally.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	<i>edulis</i>	'Nancy Garrison'	Passion fruit	Small, frilled greenish white and purple flowers, edible black skinned fruit.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	<i>edulis</i>	'Black Knight'	Passion fruit	2" white flowers, large excellent fruit. Self-fruitful. Hardy to 20 - 25F, fairly compact.

Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Allspice'	Passion flower	Big, stunning flowers 4" across, lavender with purple filaments banded white and dark purple. Very fragrant. Dies to ground below 25F but resprouts vigorously.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Blue Horizon'	Passion flower	Deep blue and white flower on a vigorous vine. Hardy to 20 - 25F.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Coral Glow'	Passion flower	Flowers pendant, up to 4" across. "Hot neon pink, cooling as the flowers age." [Suncrest] 20-25F.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Coral Seas'(jamesonii)	Passion flower	Coral pink passion flower
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Donna Brigham'	Passion flower	HOT, hot pink with a little tuft of neon purple in the center, and long filaments.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Elizabeth'	Passion flower	Spectacular purple flowers with twisty filaments, bright green shiny leaves. One of the nicest plants overall. Hardy to 20 - 25F.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Eynesford's Gem'	Passion flower	Very vigorous, but frost limits size. Small white flowers. Tendrils.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Gloria Moreno'	Passion flower	Vibrant deep pink flowers. Hardy to 25F, probably lower.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Indigo Dream'	Passion flower	White petals, dark violet filaments. Flowers remain open for a few days (most passion flowers only last a day). 20 - 25F.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Lavender Lady'	Passion flower	One of the best. Continuous bloom; glowing 3 - 4" flowers are reddish violet to lavender, with nearly white centers. Hardy to 20F or lower. <i>P. amethystina</i> x <i>P. caerulea</i> .
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Quazar'	Passion flower	Pure white flowers on a vigorous grower with dark green leaves. Hardy to 20 - 25F.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Susan Brigham'	Passion flower	Rampant grower with very large leaves. Huge deep rose-pink flowers.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Victoria '	Passion flower	Violet purple flowers, slightly darker than 'Lavender Lady' (they are very similar varieties). Foliage damaged below 25F, but quickly recovers.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	hybrid	'Witchcraft'	Passion flower	Darkest purple flowers, very hardy.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	jamesonii	'Coral Seas'	Passion flower	Very vigorous with coral red flowers. Damaged below 27F but resprouts.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	manicata	'Escobar'	Passion flower	Vivid red petals with blue filaments. 20 - 25F.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	mollissima		Passion fruit	'Fearsomely vigorous' [Suncrest] but tender; seriously damaged at 25F. Bright pink flowers, yellow edible fruit up to 6" long.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	sanguinolenta		Passion flower	Very vigorous, but frost limits size. Flared coral flowers. Tendrils.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	sanguinolenta	'Maria Rosa'	Passion flower	Coral 1 1/2" flowers on a moderate grower.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	vitifolia		Passion fruit	Also sold as <i>P. coccinea</i> . Bright red flowers. Will bear very good fruit if hand pollinated [source: MBN]; then let them ripen until wrinkled.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	X	'jamesonii'	Passion flower	Very vigorous, but frost limits size. Coral pink flowers. Tendrils.
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	x <i>alata</i> caerulea (<i>Pfordtii</i>)		Passion flower	-- a hybrid between <i>P. alata</i> and <i>P. caerulea</i> . Flower sepals alternating white and violet, with purple center. Damaged below 25F. Now called <i>P. x belottii</i>
Vine	<i>Passiflora</i>	x <i>caerulea-racemosa</i>	'Eynesford's Gem'	Passion flower	Dwarf to 6' with mauve pink flowers. Hardy to 20F.
Vine	<i>Rosa</i>	<i>banksia</i>	'Alba Plena'	White Lady Banks' rose	Very vigorous, nearly thornless rose that can grow to 30' or more. Masses of white flowers for a short period in spring. Nearly evergreen. Tie up or let it scramble into a tree.
Vine	<i>Rosa</i>	<i>banksia</i>	'Lutea'	Yellow Lady Banks' rose	Very vigorous, nearly thornless rose that can grow to 30' or more. Masses of yellow flowers for a short period in spring. Sweet scent. Nearly evergreen. Tie up or let it scramble into a tree.
Vine	<i>Rosa</i>	hybrids		Climbing Roses	Many varieties to choose from. Most need full sun; <i>Cecille Brunner Climber</i> is ok in partial shade.
Vine	<i>Solanum</i>	<i>jasminoides</i>		White Potato vine	Vigorous but not rampant vine that is nearly always in bloom. Open habit. Tie up. Variety 'Maricela' has violet-tinged flowers.
Vine	<i>Solanum</i>	<i>rantonnetii</i>		Purple Potato vine	Purple flowers in summer and fall. Freeze limits size. Can grow as shrub. Tie up.
Vine	<i>Sollya</i>	<i>heterophylla</i>		Australian bluebell creeper	Small, with dense, tiny, shiny leaves. Can be used as a ground cover. Grows slowly to about 6'. Nodding blue flowers in summer; 'Alba' has white flowers. Quite shade-tolerant. Twines.
Vine	<i>Tecoma</i>	<i>capensis</i>		Cape honeysuckle	Formerly <i>Tecomaria</i> . Shrubby vine with bright orange-red flowers (a yellow form is available) in fall and early winter, until frost kills it back. Hummingbirds love flowers. Recovers even from hard freezes. Tie up or grow as a shrub.

Vine	<i>Thunbergia</i>	<i>alata</i>	'Charles Star'		Iridescent gold and black flowers.
Vine	<i>Trachelospermum</i>	<i>asiaticum</i>		Asian jasmine	Nearly always grown as a ground cover. Hardly ever flowers; grown for shiny leaves and exceptional durability. Can be tied up as a vine, but doesn't twine.
Vine	<i>Trachelospermum</i>	<i>jasminoides</i>		Star jasmine	Can grow as a shrub or ground cover, but naturally a twining vine. Super fragrant flowers in May and June. Tolerates heat, cold, sun, shade, poor soil, drought or watering.
Vine	<i>Vigna</i>	<i>caracalla</i>		Snail Vine	Fast-growing to 10' - 12'; fragrant flowers--pale purple with darker markings--resemble twisted snail shells. Killed to the ground by freezing weather, but resprouts from roots.
Vine	<i>Vitis</i>	<i>californica</i>		Grapes	Our native grapes have seedy but very sweet, edible fruit. Some selected varieties in the trade have showy fall color.
Vine	<i>Vitis</i>	<i>vinifera</i>		Grapes	Fast-growing cover for fence or arbor. Many varieties available. Fruit is messy if not harvested, but some can be pruned to reduce fruit production.
Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>floribunda</i>		Japanese Wisteria	Very fast-growing, large vines with elegant purple or white flowers in early spring. Very fragrant. Blooms best when irrigated infrequently. Prune hard just after bloom. Japanese Wisteria needs full sun.
Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>floribunda</i>	'Black Dragon'		This variety has dark purple flowers.
Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>floribunda</i>	'Issai Prefecture'		white Japanese Wisteria
Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>floribunda</i>	'Longissima Alba'		white Japanese Wisteria
Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>floribunda</i>	'Longissima Kyushaku'		This variety has the longest clusters of all--up to 6' long! Blooms best when irrigated infrequently. Full sun.
Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>sinensis</i>		Chinese Wisteria	Very fast-growing, large vines with elegant purple or white flowers in early spring. Very fragrant. Blooms best when irrigated infrequently. Prune hard just after bloom. Chinese Wisteria will bloom in part shade.
Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>sinensis</i>	'Beni Fugi'		Pink flowers
Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>sinensis</i>	'Caroline'		Violet purple variety of Chinese Wisteria.
Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>sinensis</i>	'Cooke's Purple'		aka 'Cooke's Special'. Very fast-growing, large vine with fragrant purple flowers which open all at once in early spring. This variety often has a few blooms in summer as well. Blooms best when irrigated infrequently. Prune hard just after bloom. Chinese Wisteria will bloom in part shade.

Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>venusta</i>	'Alba'		White Silky Wisteria. Silky Wisteria will bloom in part sun.

Vine	<i>Wisteria</i>	<i>venusta</i>	'Violacea'		Purple Silky Wisteria
Annual vines	<i>Asarina</i>	<i>species</i>		Climbing Snapdragon; Chickabiddy	Twining annual vines to about 5 - 10 with tubular flowers that are usually pink, lavender, red; sometimes white. Some forms may be hardy enough to resprout as perennials.
Annual vines	<i>Dolichos</i>	<i>lablab</i>		Hyacinth bean	Pretty purple bean/pea flowers on a fast-growing summer annual. Easy to grow from seed.
Annual vines	<i>Ipomoea</i>	<i>species</i>		Morning glory	Beautiful flowers on summer annual vines. <i>I. tricolor</i> and <i>I. nil</i> are the familiar summer morning glories. Both may reseed prolifically. <i>I. alba</i> is Moonflower, with fragrant flowers that open at night. <i>I. quamoclit</i> is Cardinal Climber, with feathery divided leaves and bright red tubular flowers that attract hummingbirds. Easy to grow from seed.
Annual vines	<i>Lathyrus</i>	<i>species</i>		Sweet Pea	<i>L. latifolius</i> is a perennial relative of the common sweet pea. Easy to grow from seed.
Annual vines	<i>Phaseolus</i>	<i>species</i>		Scarlet Runner bean	Showy red bean/pea shaped flowers on a vigorous summer annual vine. Young bean pods are edible, but they toughen quickly. Shelled beans can be cooked like lima beans. Easy to grow from seed.
Annual vines	<i>Thunbergia</i>	<i>alata</i>		Orange Clock vine; Blackeyed Susan vine	Annual vine with bright orange, yellow, or white flowers with purple-black throats.
Annual vines	<i>Thunbergia</i>	<i>gregorii</i>		Orange Clock vine	Bright orange flowers on a fast-growing annual vine to 6' +. Very showy, easy to grow. May overwinter. <i>T. alata</i> is similar, with bright orange, yellow, or white flowers with purple-black throats.
Annual vines	<i>Tropaeolum</i>	<i>species</i>		Nasturtium	<i>T. majus</i> climbers can be tied up to 6', have attractive leaves and showy flowers. Flowers and foliage have spicy scent. Look best here in summer in light shade; often overwinter. <i>T. peregrinum</i> is the Canary Bird flower, with lobed leaves and fringed yellow flowers; grows to 10' +. Easy to grow from seed.

Smaller-leaved types come in hundreds of varieties; great as filler in containers, or for a ground cover in confined situation. Vine ground covers	<i>Lonicera</i>	<i>japonica</i>	'Halliana'	Hall's Japanese honeysuckle	Rampant vine with fragrant flowers throughout the summer. Can be pruned severely or mowed occasionally. Shade tolerant. Twines.
Vine ground covers	<i>Sollya</i>	<i>heterophylla (fusiformis)</i>		Australian bluebell creeper	Small, with dense, tiny, shiny leaves. Can be used as a ground cover. Grows slowly to about 6' tall when supported; 1' - 2' as a ground cover. Nodding blue flowers in summer; 'Alba' has white flowers.
